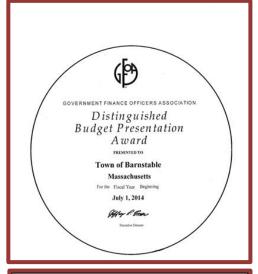
Financial Overview Report

For The Fiscal Year Beginning July 1, 2015

This financial overview is intended for the residents, prospective residents, and business owners, of the Town of Barnstable, which includes the villages of Barnstable, Centerville, Cotuit, Hyannis, Marstons Mills, Osterville, and West Barnstable. All the information contained here is from fiscal year 2016 (FY16), which started July 1, 2015 and runs through June 30, 2016. The goal of this overview is to give the reader concise information as to how the town operates by taking several hundred pages of budgeting detail and condensing it to just several pages of information. This leaves out a considerable amount of data, but for those of you who want to dig deeper, the complete FY16 budget is available through the Town of Barnstable website. In addition to the budget, the website includes financial information for the last five years (all of which has been audited by an independent accounting firm), as well as financial forecasts for the next ten years. GFOA AWARDS





The Town has received the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) Distinguished **Budget Presentation** Award for 14 consecutive years and the Certificate of Excellence in Financial Reporting for 13 consecutive years. The GFOA established these award programs to encourage and assist state and local governments to prepare budget documents and comprehensive annual financial reports of the very highest quality that evidence the spirit of transparency and full disclosure and then to recognize individual governments that succeed in achieving those goals.

Barnstable is one of only seven communities in the state to receive both awards.

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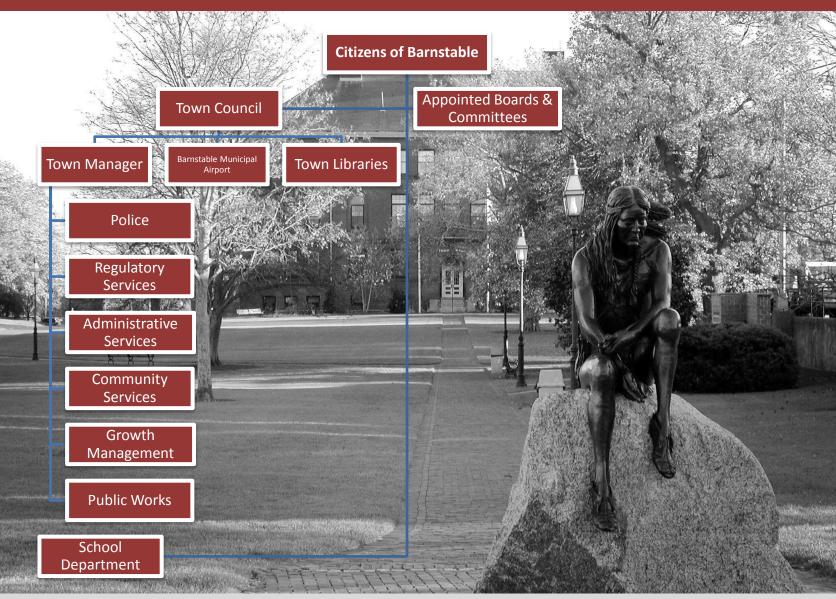


AAA Bond Rating

The Town's most recent bond rating from Standard and Poor's was AAA, which is the highest possible rating assigned to bonds by the credit rating agencies. This means the Town can borrow money at favorable rates saving significant money in interest costs on its capital program. S&P cited the following reasons for their AAA rating of the Town:

- A very strong economy, which participates in the strong Boston metropolitan statistical area;
- Very strong budgetary flexibility, with available reserves in excess of 15% of general fund expenditures for the most recent three audited years;
- Strong budgetary performance and stable and consistent revenue profile;
- Very strong liquidity, providing very strong cash levels to cover both debt service and expenditures;
- Very strong management practices and policies that we believe are embedded and sustainable; and
- Strong debt and contingent liabilities, albeit large pension and other postemployment benefits (OPEB) liabilities.

SUMMARY

The Town of Barnstable is governed by a Council-Manager form of government, in accordance with its Home Rule Charter that was adopted in 1989. Administrative authority of the Town is vested in the Town Manager subject to legislative decisions of a 13-member Town Council. Council terms are staggered four-year terms from thirteen precincts on a nonpartisan basis. The Town Manager supervises and directs the administration of all municipal departments with the exception of the School Department and the Barnstable Municipal Airport.

An elected School Committee consisting of five persons, and a Superintendent appointed by the School Committee governs the School Department. A seven member Airport Commission appointed by the Town Council governs Barnstable's Municipal Airport. An Airport Manager, appointed by the Airport Commission, is responsible for administration and day-to-day operations of the airport. The Town Council is also the appointing authority to over 40 boards and committees with approximately 291 seats.

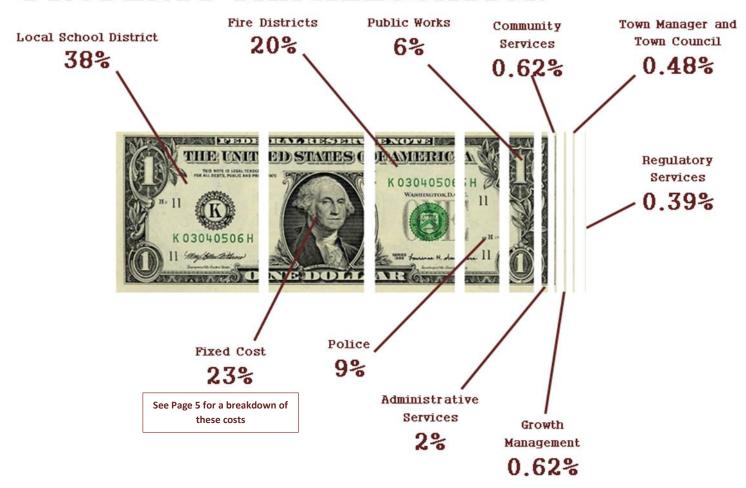
Property Taxes

By Law, Proposition 2½ limits property tax levy increases to 2½ percent year-over-year, plus amounts related to newly developed property. The levy limit applies to the total amount of property taxes to be raised by the Town, and does not apply to an individual tax bill. Although, many important expenses (such as health care) are increasing by more than 2½ percent per year, the Town has been able to manage the overall budget and remain within the prescribed limit. The single tax rate for the Town in FY15 was \$8.40 per \$1,000 in valuation. This single rate is before any exemptions or shifts among



various property types. The Town Council adopted a 20% residential exemption in FY15, which resulted in the residential tax rate increasing to \$9.30. Qualifying homeowners whose primary residence is in Barnstable receive a reduction in their assessed taxable value of \$87,192. The tax reduction is valued at \$811. The median price of a home in FY15 was \$309,100 town-wide, which would result in a town tax bill of \$2,596. This does not include the Fire District tax which would vary depending upon which district the property was located within. There are a total of 20,802 single-family homes. There are also several thousand condominiums and multi-family properties.

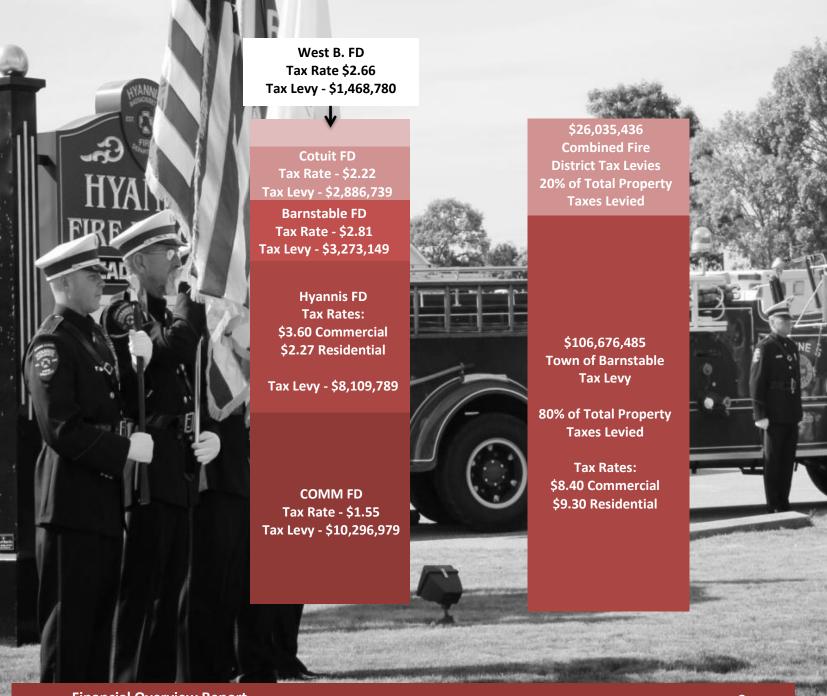
PROPERTY TAX ALLOCATION



Fire and Water Districts

The Town's five Fire Districts are independent government agencies. Each district was created through special acts of the state legislature between 1895 and 1949. The Fire Districts have the authority to levy and collect their own taxes, which is done in partnership with the Town of Barnstable's tax office. This is why there are separate line items for Fire Districts and town taxes on real estate property tax bills. Elected boards govern these districts. Policy and budgets are set at annual spring meetings, which are open to any voting resident of the district.

The five Fire Districts are: Barnstable, Centerville-Osterville-Marstons Mills (COMM), Cotuit, Hyannis, and West Barnstable. Four of the five districts also manage their own water supply operations. The one exception is Hyannis, which manages its water through the Water Supply Division, which is part of Town government. The Water Departments bill their customers directly. In addition to the property taxes levied by the Town of \$106,676,485 the total property taxes levied by the 5 districts total \$26,035,436; or 20% of the total property taxes levied.

The General Fund is the largest source of funding and covers everything from police, to road repair, senior services, conservation, legal, information technology, and administration. There are too many services to list here, but for the purposes of this overview, it is important to note that the General Fund is part of the annual budget process. This is where all property taxes are credited. The General Fund in FY16 is budgeted at \$149M (M = million). The approved current budget is 3.41% higher than the previous year.



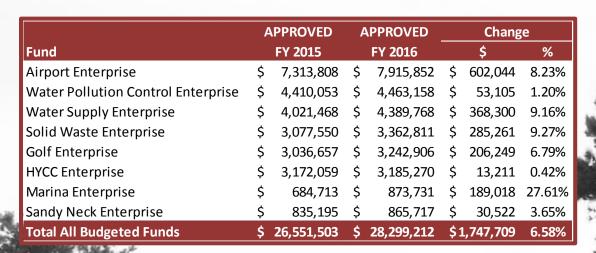

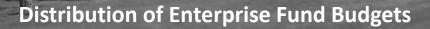

Similar to the General Fund, these funds all require annual appropriation by the Town Council. They are unique in that the goal of each fund is to be self-sustaining, which means the fees collected from their users should be sufficient to cover the costs of delivering the services. However, notwithstanding the goal of self-sufficiency, the funds can be subsidized from the General Fund. There are eight Enterprise Funds.



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Capital Outlay, 2% Benefits, 4%

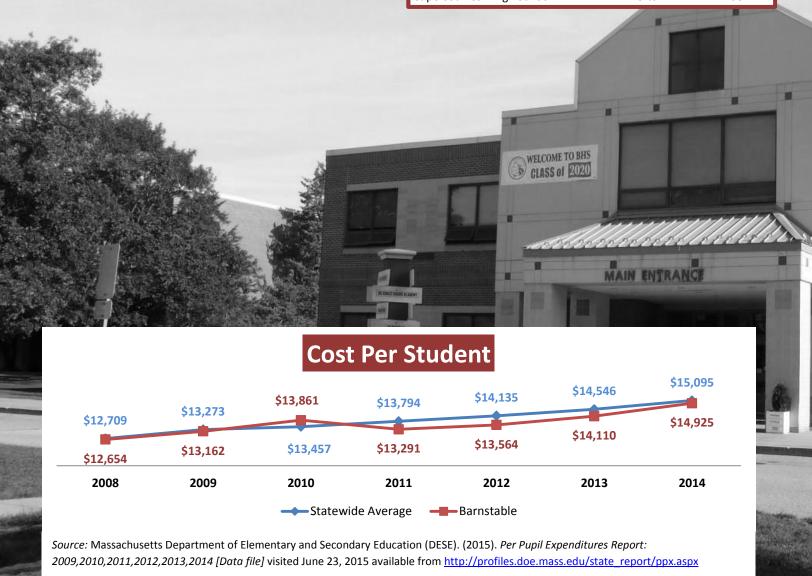

Capital Improvement Program (CIP)

The Town will raise money to finance some of its capital projects by selling municipal bonds. The Town is making strides in FY16 to improve its own assets by investing \$27.4M in capital projects. As an example, the Town invests \$3.25 million annually in the public road infrastructure. Approved projects for FY16 are divided as follows: \$15.2M for the General Fund projects and \$12.2M for Enterprise Fund projects. A complete list of projects can be found on the Town's website, but for the purposes of this overview, here's a sample of some of the projects.

The capital projects identified by the Town departments in this year's CIP process represents a total of \$52,291,736 for FY16, and a combined total of \$115,634,507 over a five-year period. Of the \$115 million, approximately \$43 million represents enterprise funds and \$73 million are general fund requests.

Barnstable's Tax Base

Barnstable has one of the largest tax bases in the Commonwealth. Total property valuation for fiscal year 2015 was \$12.6 billion which placed the Town in 6th place overall. Under Proposition 2 ½ the Town's maximum tax levy could be as high as 2.5% of the total property valuation; or \$315,000,000. The fiscal year 2015 tax levy was \$106,676,485 resulting in Barnstable taxing at 34% of its levy capacity. The additional taxing capacity can only be accessed through voter approved tax levy overrides.

Barnstable's commercial property tax base in fiscal year 2015 was \$1.2 billion making it the 11th largest commercial tax base in the Commonwealth. Most of the commercial tax base is located in the village of Hyannis which makes it the commercial hub of Cape Cod.



The Town receives dozens of grants every year. Some are to offset operating expenses (mainly in the School Department) and many are for capital improvements.
